The Messageries Maritimes Steamship "Polynésien" arrived at the anchorage at Suez, on Monday 27<sup>th</sup> February at 4 a.m. after a splendid voyage from Marseilles.

Commandant Boulard reports having left that port on January 29<sup>th</sup> at 5 p.m. and after a perfect passage across the Mediterranean, the steamer reached Port Said on the 2<sup>d</sup> February at 8.30 p.m. where some coal was taken into bunkers and the canal entered at midnight.

A departure was taken from Suez at 12.30 a.m. on the 4<sup>th</sup> and the voyage through the Red Sea completed in 3 days and 2 hours during which fine weather was experienced, thus permitting the passengers to indulge in a continual round of deck games by day and concerts as well as various other kinds of amusements during the evening.

Colombo was reached on the 13<sup>th</sup> February at 4 a.m. and after transferring a large number of passengers and 500 bags of mails to the M. M. S. S. "Océanien" bound to China and Japan and taking some passengers for the Colonies, a start was made at 11.30 p.m. on the same day.

Hence to Australia, the same beautifully calm weather which had prevailed during the earlier part of the trip was again experienced with slight S. S. E. breeze.

The steamer made her usual call at Albany, arrived at 4 p.m. on the 23<sup>rd</sup> February she left at 7 a.m. on the next day, after taking some coal. — Then long swell S. S. O breeze, and on the 26<sup>th</sup> rough sea. —
