

IMMIGRATION RESTRICTION ACTS 1901-1905.

11. The Master of every vessel, other than a public vessel of any Government, arriving at any port in the Commonwealth, from parts beyond the Commonwealth, with any passengers on board for that port, shall, before making entry at the Customs, deliver to an officer a list of all such passengers, specifying, to the best of his knowledge, the name, the nationality and race, the place of shipment, and the calling and occupation of each such passenger; and he shall, if required by the officer, certify in writing that to the best of his knowledge and belief none of the passengers in the list (except as therein stated) is an idiot or insane person, or a person suffering from an infectious or contagious disease of a loathsome or dangerous character, or a person likely by reason of any physical disability to become a charge upon the public or upon any public or charitable institution.

Note - The particulars on this form are summarized by the Officer who completes Return No 5 (Return of persons admitted without being asked to pass the Education test) Form No 12 must be furnished at every port where passengers land.											
<p>On the arrival at the first port of call in the Commonwealth of vessels from abroad an examination of all passengers who may be on board should be made by the officers. All coloured persons who are not exempted by the Act, or referred to in the preceding paragraph, and who are unprovided with documents authorizing them to land, must be asked to pass the dictation test, and in the event of their failing, a notice should be served on the Master on Form No. 9. Particulars respecting persons rejected should be indorsed on the ship's papers for the information of Customs officers at subsequent ports of call.</p> <p>On the arrival at any port in the Commonwealth of vessels from abroad the officer shall obtain from the Master a list of passengers (Form No. 12) for such port. New forms are being sent; the attention of Masters should be invited to the note at foot.</p> <p>Paragraph (b).—Officers will use their discretion as to applying this law. Persons who are suffering from any serious physical incapacity, and who are without means, may be regarded as coming within its terms; but Europeans of sound bodily health, notwithstanding that they have no money, should not be so regarded, and are to be admitted without restriction. It is necessary for an officer to form his opinion before the immigrant leaves the ship.</p> <p>Paragraph (c).—Idiots or insane persons can only be permitted to land on Certificates of Exemption on a bond (Form No. 29) being given for £500.</p> <p>In cases in which the State authorities obtain a bond for the maintenance of such persons during their stay in the State, a bond on the Commonwealth form need not be taken, but officers should be sure that security has been given before permitting the entry of any such persons.</p> <p>Paragraph (e).—The principal object of this paragraph is to meet cases of escapees from New Caledonia who may reach the Commonwealth.</p> <p>Paragraph (g).—Eliminated. Contract Immigrants Act has taken its place. (See separate Instructions.)</p> <p>Paragraph (h).—The object of a Certificate of Exemption is to enable persons who would otherwise be regarded as prohibited immigrants to stay in the Commonwealth for limited periods. Such certificates can only be issued by officers specially appointed.</p> <p>C.394.</p>
